Option k is the primary reason God sent Jonah. Jonah's name literally means "dove," a bîrd traditionally used as a messenger, as well as, a symbol of peace. God is merciful, but he is also just. The Ninevites later went back to their wicked ways and God destroyed them. (See II Kings 14:25) At the time of Jonah it was a large Gentile city, about 60 miles in circumference and contained about 600,000 people. Ninevah was the capital city of Assyria. Assyria was one of the most cruel and brutal nations in the ancient world. They thought nothing of burying their enemies alive, skinning them alive, or impaling them on sharp poles under the hot sun until they died of sunburn and exposure.

Jonah's hometown was Gath-heper in the Northern Kingdom of Israel, about four miles north of Nazareth. He was the Son of Amittai, of whom nothing more is known. His approximate dates of ministry were 782-753 BC.

Other biblical references to Jonah seem to indicate that this is a true account. There are also documented accounts of men who have been swallowed and lived for 2 days inside a whale and lived to tell the story. In Luke 11:29-32, and Matthew 12:39-41, Jesus refers to the story as a fact.

The students are given several choices that directly correlate with the questions asked of Jonah. The idea is to get the students to examine the story of Jonah and relate it to themselves. It is to get them out of the realm of just "knowledge" and into seeing how scripture applies to that they can live a life of obedience. You might have each youth write their choice anonymously on a notecard to give you an indication of your group.

Possible answers: family, dealing with drugs, alcohol, eating disorders, or sex in one's personal life, school, life as a missionary, non-Christian friends, taking a stand for Christ, living for Christ, etc.

see student guide for options. Encourage youth to share how they feel. You might take several of the possible Ninevah's identified in question #9 and have youth share what they might feel if that had been the Ninevah to which God called them.

11. How do people run away from God today?

Don't go to church, don't read their Bible, stop praying, substitute something else for God, avoid Christians, rebel, violence, literally run awayetc.

12. In what areas of your life are you now running from God?

Youth may be running away from many things: School pressure, family conflicts, relationships, or may just desire to do things that they know are wrong. When we run from God, we may not always run away to do wrong. We might run away to do good. The problem is that we are not where God wants us to be. Most of the time when we sin it is because we are not where we are supposed to be. (e.g. David was on the rooftop instead of the battlefield, and got himself into trouble with Bathsheba.) You are safer in a danger zone if God wants you to be there than in a comfortable area that God does not want you to be.

(See student page for specific options) You might ask this as a general question first i.e. What are some of the reasons youth run away from what God wants them to do?
